



Organizational Chart








The MVFD is dedicated to minimizing the impact of fire, hazardous conditions, illness and injury with a caring and efficient response.





The Miami Valley Fire District provides Advanced Life Support (ALS) from personnel certified by the Ohio **Department of Public Safety and** governed by the Greater Miami Valley EMS Council. This service is administered through the use of first response ALS medical units. Personnel hold certifications of **Emergency Medical Technician Basic** (EMT-B) or Emergency Medical Technician Paramedic (EMT-P). The re-certification of the membership is administered pursuant to Ohio Department of Public requirements. Requests for fire and emergency medical assistance are channeled through the Regional Dispatch Center. Following standardized "Emergency Medical Dispatch" protocols, fire and emergency medical units are dispatched to EMS incidents.



Fire Suppression



Priorities

The fire district's priorities for providing fire suppression include life safety, controlling and extinguishment of fire, incident stabilization and property conservation. Members of the fire district are trained and equipped to perform aggressive interior and exterior fire attack when operating in the investigatory, fast attack and command modes. Fire suppression operations are delivered using personnel and apparatus that are strategically located throughout the response jurisdiction. When required or conditions exist that dictate the need for additional resources, automatic or mutual aid is supplied by neighboring communities.



Based upon community risk assessment and preplanning, the types of fires the district may be called upon to extinguish involve but are not limited to: brush, structural (residential and commercial occupancies), combustible and flammable liquids, electrical, vehicle and other forms of transportation. Since the communities contain major state roads and highways (Routes 725, 741, I75 and I675), a variety of vehicles travel through our response jurisdiction.


TRAINING

the district's safety goals. Fire safety
Inspections, code enforcement,
building plan review, prefire planning,
and public education are all
components of the prevention
program.

On Duty Crews conduct annual business inspections in their response area throughout the year. Members of the district are required to obtain Fire Safety Inspector certification.

The MVFD takes pride in public education. Along teaching CPR, Fire Extinguisher, and Safety Classes, crews spend the month of October in the Elementary Schools teaching Fire Safety.


